

# UCL iMerc Newsletter — Vol. 21, December 2025


#### About us

Over the past 20 years, we have been developing the International Music Education Research Centre (iMerc) at the UCL Institute of Education to celebrate and disseminate our extensive research in the field of music education, broadly conceived. In the beginning, we often held our research seminars over several days, such as in different European cities to allow our doctoral students to have more intensive support as a community, to listen to local researchers, and to share their ongoing research journeys. These 'Travelling Research Seminars' visited Ireland (Limerick), Spain (Barcelona), Italy (Bologna) and Sweden (Malmö) and helped us to establish our international profile. With the advent of the Covid-19 pandemic in 2020, we have been meeting more regularly, both online and in person, to continue to share new research and insights related to diverse topics in music education. We are a group of researchers at doctoral and post-doctoral levels, as well as senior researchers, with a shared curiosity and interest in advancing basic and applied research. In line with our mission, the monthly seminars continue to foster a sense of shared endeavour amongst colleagues who are based in the UK, across mainland Europe (such as Portugal, Germany, Greece, Skandinavia), Asia (China, including Hong Kong), Latin America, USA and Australia. 



#### **Celebrating a Successful Sempre Student Study Day**

<u>The Sempre Student Study Day</u> brought together a diverse group of doctoral researchers attending both in person at UCL and online to share research across music psychology, music education, and related fields. The event welcomed 46 participants, including 12 doctoral presenters from nine university departments and conservatoires, with international representation from Germany, Spain, China, Korea, and the UK.


The day offered a vibrant mix of presentations on topics from AI in music education to cross-cultural performance anxiety, mood and music, infant language learning through song, multisensory concert experiences, choral singing and hearing impairment, and more. The atmosphere was lively and collegial: participants engaged in stimulating discussion, made new connections, and many stayed on after the formal session to continue conversations over refreshments.



# Symposium Spotlight: Methodological Challenges and Perspectives in Multimodal Music Performance Research

A two-day international symposium will take place at the University of Luxembourg in January 2026, organised by the SAMUSE project (IAS – Audacity) at the Institute of Musicology and the Arts. The event focuses on *Methodological Challenges and Perspectives in Multimodal Music Performance Research*. Details can be found HERE.

The symposium brings together leading scholars working with psychophysiological and biomechanical approaches to explore the cognitive, emotional, and motor dimensions of

music performance. Emphasis will be placed on the methodological complexities of multimodal data collection, analysis, interpretation, and questions of ecological validity. The event aims to foster interdisciplinary exchange across musicology, neuroscience, engineering, and computer science, while identifying future research directions.

### Online Event: Unpacking the CAR for Music Teachers in England

An online consultation hosted by the Independent Society of Musicians will take place on 17 January, focusing on the implications of the Curriculum and Assessment Review for music education in England and the development of a new National Music Curriculum.

With the final CAR report published on 5 November and the EBacc now removed, the event will examine what the review recommends for music and how the government has responded.

The session will feature contributions from Sally Bacon, Co Chair of the Cultural Learning Alliance, and Kevin Rogers, music education specialist, who will highlight the key findings of the report and their significance for music teachers.

Participants will also be invited to take part in breakout discussions, offering a chance to share perspectives on how music can be better supported in state schools and what should be prioritised in a new National Music Curriculum.

The free event will be held on 17 January from 10.00 to 12.30, with advance registration required. Details can be found <u>HERE</u>.

# Call for Papers: Chamber Music, Synergies Through Time, Places and Spaces

A call for papers has been announced for the conference *Chamber music: synergies through time, places and spaces*, to be held on 13 March 2026 at the Norwegian Church Arts Centre in Cardiff, Wales. Proposals are invited from postgraduate students and early career researchers for academic papers and lecture recitals of up to 20 minutes, followed by a ten minute question and answer session. Contributors should note that no piano will be available at the venue.

The conference will explore the socio cultural interdependence of Western art chamber music performance across historical periods. It will examine chamber music in performance and pedagogical contexts and consider the impact of chamber music performers on the communities they engage with. Submissions are welcomed from across music research, including musicology, music pedagogy, practice as research, and interdisciplinary approaches.

Proposed topics may include factors influencing shifts in chamber music practices, the impact of expanding performance contexts such as concert halls and festivals, the social role of chamber music performers in historical or contemporary settings, and interdisciplinary approaches reflecting the diverse ways chamber music is experienced by performers and communities.

Submissions should include an abstract of no more than 300 words and a short biography of up to 150 words. Proposals must be submitted by 17 December 2025 at 6pm GMT via the online form: <a href="https://forms.gle/uEjaVL7wWLQo7SEHA">https://forms.gle/uEjaVL7wWLQo7SEHA</a>. Applicants will be notified of decisions by early January 2026. The working language of the conference will be English.
